

**Support Greater Energy Efficiency Commitments in
HB 1558 (Kilgore): Grid Transformation and Security Act**

The Substitute Bill, which was reported out of the House Commerce and Labor subcommittee #3, does not do enough for energy efficiency. If the utilities are allowed to keep any portion of customer money, then funding energy efficiency programs should be a priority since energy efficiency programs directly help customers lower their electricity bills and are more readily available to a wider number of customers.

In order to prioritize energy efficiency this bill should:

- Require Investor-Owned Utilities (IOU) fund energy efficiency programs for residential and commercial customers as a percent of annual electricity sales.
- Provide a specific dollar amount for Dominion Energy's commitment to their shareholder-funded Energy Share Weatherization program. The bill states that APCo will commit \$10M annually to their low-income program but does not provide a specific dollar amount for Dominion Energy's program.
- Create a stakeholder process to provide input on energy efficiency program design and implementation, before formal filings and proceedings. Participants should include IOUs, energy efficiency implementers and providers as well as advocates who regularly engage in these formal proceedings. This stakeholder process should be jointly staffed by the SCC and the State Energy Office (DMME)
- View energy efficiency as a priority resource over supply-side alternatives during the IRP process.

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
